The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Slow-no wake speed means a very slow speed whereby the wake or wash created by the vessel would be minimal.

On the waters of White Lake, City of Montague and City of Whitehall, from the Highway 31 bridge south to a line which extends in an easterly direction (90 degrees true) from the southernmost portion of Maple Beach park to the nearest landfill, it is unlawful for the operator of a vessel to exceed a slow-no wake speed.
